

The Kentucky CASA Network, Inc. Biennial Report

January 2019

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INTRODUCTION

The Kentucky CASA Network, Inc. (KCN) is the state Court Appointed Special Advocate association as described in Kentucky Revised Statute 620.530(1). Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) are trained community volunteers appointed by judges to represent the best interests of dependent, abused, and neglected children in court. KRS 620.500 et seq. Local CASA programs are nonprofit organizations that train and supervise CASA volunteers. There are currently 22 local CASA programs and more than 1,100 CASA volunteers across Kentucky.

As the state association, the KCN is directed by statute to provide certain evaluations and recommendations relating to child welfare to the Supreme Court, the Governor, the Legislative Research Commission, and the Cabinet for Health and Family Services in the odd-numbered years. Specifically, KRS 620.535(3) requires the state association to "evaluate and make recommendations" regarding:

- (a) Laws of the Commonwealth and practices, policies, and procedures within the Commonwealth affecting the welfare of children and families; and
- (b) The effectiveness, or lack thereof, and the reasons therefore, of local CASA volunteers advocating for placement for the children in the Commonwealth.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND OBSERVATIONS FOR POLICY REFORM AND IMPROVED EFFICIENCIES IN THE CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM IN KENTUCKY

I. Shorten the length of time for completing CASA volunteer child abuse/neglect background checks with the CHFS by allowing CASA programs to submit their requests to the local/regional DCBS offices

<u>Evaluation</u>: In 2018, the turnaround for receiving completed background checks for CASA volunteers was substantially lengthened because of the increase in volume for background check requests the CHFS was experiencing due to requests from other agencies/providers.

The KCN is concerned that the delay in background checks has delayed the appointment of CASA volunteers to cases. In 2018, CASA programs reported that 56 volunteers were not appointed to a case that year due to the length of time for getting background checks completed.

Recommendation: The KCN recognizes that much of this delay may be outside the control of the CHFS. One recommendation for consideration by the CHFS is to allow local CASA programs to make requests for background checks through their local/regional DCBS offices and for the local DCBS offices to complete the checks for the local CASA program. This decentralization may allow staff who are not otherwise already engaged in doing background checks to conduct the background checks for the local CASA program.

II. Additional collaboration between local DCBS offices and local CASA programs regarding the sharing of case-related information

Evaluation: CASA volunteers are required to work with the local cabinet representatives to advocate for the best interests of the children they are assigned (KRS 620.525(2)(k)). For this reason, CASA volunteers should be sharing the information they uncover and their court reports with the assigned social worker to improve the outcomes for the child. Likewise, local Cabinet workers need to share their information and court reports with the CASA volunteer once assigned to a case. Although CASA volunteers are entitled to the case-related information (KRS 620.505-.550), oftentimes local Cabinet workers seem unclear about the information the CASA volunteer is entitled to and do not share important information with the CASA volunteers. Specifically, CASA volunteers should be: (i) informed when a CASA child has been moved to a new foster home or placement, (ii) provided copies of the social worker's court report in advance of court and at least when it is served on the parties to the case, and (iii) provided notice when a treatment planning conference/review is scheduled.

<u>Recommendation</u>: The CHFS, local DCBS offices, the KCN, and local CASA programs should engage in joint training efforts to educate front-line Cabinet staff and CASA program staff/volunteers about the types of information that can and should be shared among the two stakeholders to support the CASA volunteer's ability to advocate for the child's best interest.

III. AOC should provide instructions and additional guidance to local clerks of the court to assure that CASA programs are provided with copies of court orders and other filings in the court record once a CASA volunteer is appointed

<u>Evaluation</u>: Once the court has referred a case to the CASA program and a CASA volunteer is appointed, local CASA programs should receive information relating to the court case, particularly court orders and notice of all scheduled hearings. In some jurisdictions, the local clerk of the court may be unaware of this requirement and the local CASA program works to educate the clerk about the role of the CASA and the need to receive copies of court orders, etc. per KRS 620.505 and KRS 620.520.

Recommendation: Local CASA programs' efforts to work with the clerk of the court may be strengthened with additional guidance from the AOC to the local clerk about including CASA programs in the electronic records management system, and how to best include the CASA program so that the program is included on the service list and receives copies of all orders and notice of any hearings in the case to which a CASA is appointed.

THE ROLE OF THE CASA VOLUNTEER IN THE CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM IN KENTUCKY

CASA volunteers in the Commonwealth of Kentucky play a vital role in many aspects of the child welfare system that include family and juvenile courts, DCBS, and the juvenile justice system. CASA volunteers serve as child advocates providing a much-needed voice for an

abused and neglected child caught up in a complex and daunting system through no fault of their own.

CASA volunteers are objective, community-based volunteers who are appointed by judges to serve in child abuse, neglect, and dependency cases. Once assigned to a child, the volunteer has regular in-person visits with the child, researches the child's case, reviews documents, interviews relevant people to the case, and makes a report to the court as to what is in the best interest of the child, in terms of services, placement, visitation, reunification, and permanency. CASA volunteers monitor the child's placement, whether they are in foster care, in relative placement, or remain in their current homes with their biological parents until permanency is achieved. Volunteers are often the only constant the child knows as he/she moves through the labyrinth of the child welfare system. This unique role is one that allows the CASA volunteer and local CASA programs to view the system with a unique lens.

Requirements and Description of a CASA Volunteer in Kentucky

Volunteers are screened, trained, and supervised by professional staff at local CASA programs. Pursuant to standards from the National CASA Association and Kentucky statutory provisions, volunteers are required to receive a minimum of 30 hours of initial training, engage in court observation pre-service if possible, and attend 12 hours of ongoing training each year.

State Funding Allocation by the 2018 Legislature

The Kentucky Legislature allocated \$1.406 million in each FY '19 and FY '20 to be distributed to the Court Appointed Special Advocates Program in the form of grants through the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet. This appropriation was the second budget year to fund the CASA program in Kentucky. In the 2016 budget year, CASA was allocated a total of \$3 million, which marked the first time Kentucky allocated state dollars to the CASA program. The Kentucky

CASA Network has a two-year contract with the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet to administer and pass through the FY '19 and FY '20 General Fund Allocation in the form of subgrants to local CASA programs in Kentucky. SB 204 also passed in the 2018 Legislature, which created the Kentucky CASA Network Trust Fund.




